10	Adopt	Phase 3 Community Reintegration: Discussed in further detail below, this phase will include <b>evidence-informed reentry case management</b> , access to education, vocational training, and employment outside of the facility		
11	Adopt	Phase 3 Community Reintegration: After 180 days post-release, required youth meetings/engagement should decrease. The youth will be expected to engage in face-to-face meetings with the Reentry Case Manager once per month to review progress, reinforce positive behaviors, and provide support on reentry plan goals. The DPO should begin assessment for program completion.

17	Reject	Phase 2 Programming: As youth prepare for community reintegration, they will participate in a court release hearing and MDT meeting to review progress and explore next steps.		Courts will have to determine feasibility

24	Reject	Phase 1 Orientation: Inclusion of a Community Representative from a local CBO to the MDT	IJ is not aware of any research suggesting that community representation would be of benefit to the youth in an MDT context.
